Enrollment Management Celebrates Success

The tireless work of the U's Enrollment Management teams, led by Vice Provost Steve Robinson, was recognized during a Dec. 14 celebration. Notable achievements included:

— The New Student Orientation team welcoming over 10,000 students and parents to campus and hosting the U's first-ever off-site orientation in Honolulu. — The launch of <u>Utah Direct</u>, a new university pilot program guaranteeing admission to

Utah's brightest students. — The financial aid team overcoming FAFSA challenges, eventually bringing applications

up 10% from last year.

— The Office of Admissions processing a record number of applications.

— Launch of *The Nest*, the U's new magazine for prospective students.

Additionally, this fall Enrollment Management welcomed over a thousand prospective students and their families to on-campus Discover the U events, which featured campus tours, information sessions with colleges and other campus partners and, for the first time, translation services for Spanish speakers.

Congratulations to each department—from the Office of Admissions and the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid to the Office of Orientation and Transition and the Office of the Registrar—for contributing to advancing the Impact 2030 goal of having 40,000 students on campus.


